I Eli Gould, a citizen of the United States,  
resident in the Town of Heath in the  
County of Franklin in the State of Mas-  
sachusetts, aged fifty one years the  
fifth day of May last, on oath declare  
that I belonged to the Army of the  
United States in the revolutionary  
war - I entered the service in the  
month of June 1776, as a soldier  
in the Company commanded by  
Capt. Lord of the Second Massachusetts  
Regiment commanded by  
Col. Sprague & I was turned in the  
service about eighteen months,  
when being sick, I received a dis-  
charge under the hand of Genl.  
Marshall at West Point; which Dis-  
charge I have lost, I do not know  
what has become of it. I am not  
wholly dislocated (disjointed) but  
am every day more and more  
crippled, can less & less stand in  
need of the assistance of any man  
for a report. Dated April 10th  
A.D. 1818

At a Special Session of the Circuit Court of Common Pleas, for the Western Circuit, begun and holden at Greenfield, within and for the County of Franklin, on Monday the tenth day of July, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and twenty, et de die in diem to the fifteenth day of the same month,

PERSONALLY appeared in open Court, being a Court of Record, within and for said County of Franklin, established as such by the Constitution and Laws of said Commonwealth, *Eli Lyould*,  
aged fifty four years, resident in Heath,  
in said County, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows:

I enlisted under Capt. Lord in the second Massachusetts Regiment commanded by Col. Ebenezer Sprout and was discharged at the close of the war. I made application & declaration for a pension before Judge Leavitt on or about the thirty first day of March 1818 and received a certificate numbered 5,733. — I am a shuemaker by occupation. My wife Bernie, aged 52, is weakly. My children, under age, are Daniel aged 20, Sally & Nancy, twins, aged 18, Stillman aged 15, Eli 13; Betsey 12; Almira 7; I honestly owe

*more than two hundred dollars,*

and I do solemnly swear, that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me, nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

Replying to your recent communication you are advised that Eli Gould made an application for pension on April 6, 1812, at which time he was 51 years of age and residing at Heath, Mass., and his pension was allowed for about eighteen months' actual service as a private in the Mass. troops, Revolutionary war; a part of the time he served under Capt. Lord and Col. Sproat. Place of his enlistment not stated.
